

Swiss artist Zimoun's 'Wall of Sound' engages the senses.

new exhibit featuring a one-of-a-kind sound sculpture by Swiss artist Zimoun Lis coming to UC Irvine's Beall Center for Art + Technology this Thursday.

The exhibit titled "Wall of Sound" features a new work that incorporates industrial objects and structures to form an immersive display that stimulates the senses and explores mechanical rhythm.

He's never shown his work in this way," said David Familian, associate director of the Beall Center. "That's what makes it so unique."

Zimoun's new work on display at the Beall Center will include more than 400 cardboard boxes equipped with cotton balls, filler wire and mechanical motors to create percussive sounds.

As art-goers make their way through the maze-like display, sounds continually shift and change.

Zimoun, known as a selftaught artist, gives new life to materials such as boxes,

plastic bags, cotton balls, motors, speakers and microphones. By combining these materials, Zimoun's work marries visual, sonic and spatial landscapes for a unique experience. "A lot of the exhibits we

show involve works that engage the body," Familian said. "It's not just what your eyes see. Your whole body can have interaction with the work in some way. The exhibit will also fea-

ture video displays of Zimoun's other sound sculptures. "Wall of Sound" runs

through May 3.
